Our celebrations are because of people like you - your time, your financial support, your trust. Your continued generosity sustains and validates our work. Your belief in Hospitality House motivates us to continue our quest for economic justice, for housing equity, for full civic participation, and fuller appreciation of community artists. The struggle chose us - and we chose to fight.

Our accomplishments are made possible by the support, hard work and selfless contributions of hundreds of donors, and dozens of Hospitality House staff and volunteers - many of whom experienced the same struggles of so many in our community. Our reflections acknowledge the perseverance of all those dedicated to lifting up the best of what we can be - together. From struggle to survival, to recovery and renewal - there is triumph through tears.

As we emerge from the depths of the COVID pandemic, we reaffirm our commitment to each other and

to our community. COVID's hardships and its challenges have permanently affected our emotional well-being. COVID's long term consequences for communities of color have yet to be fully realized. San Franciscans from all walks of life have been touched in some way by this pandemic. Grief and loss has visited so many of us; the long, painful journey toward wellness continues.

The City of St. Francis needed - and still needs - all of its namesake's boundless capacity for love, in order to survive. The pandemic deepened our resolve, and reaffirmed that what binds us together is our humanity.

Hospitality House is proud to recognize those whose longevity and dedication demonstrate unquestioned commitment to their craft, with collective service of more than 160 years. Across the City, valiant nonprofit warriors in San Francisco's human services field labored long and hard to bring the best of themselves to this once-in-a-century calamity.

Every day, nonprofit workers risked their physical and emotional health, and that of their loved ones and families. They stayed and they fought and they endured for their communities. They are often underpaid and underappreciated.

In many ways, nonprofit workers withstood a near-constant barrage of criticism and negativity, largely for failing to permanently solve problems not of their making. Somehow they managed to fortify their own spirits and replenish their own depleted stores of compassion, even as they consistently lifted those of countless others. Despite the obstacles and the heartache, they strove on, and honored their commitment to their communities, and one another.

**San Francisco's nonprofit workers do remarkable work, under enormous stress, and are often unappreciated - and underpaid. In partnership with public and private funders, Hospitality House raised salaries of ALL frontline workers and support staff more than \$5,000 in a single year! A concrete investment in those giving their best to their communities - every day.**

Our Annual Report acknowledges, in some small way, what these remarkable people have meant - and mean - to San Francisco. What they've meant to Hospitality House.

They've taught us that engagement is effective, that connections are meaningful - and relationships matter. Hospitality House continues to draw from their collective wellspring of experience and commitment. We're grateful.

Lastly, some reflection. It is with deep and profound sadness that we say goodbye to Joyce Juan-Manalo, our friend and supporter, visionary arts warrior for the ages, and always, our sister-in-the-struggle. Joyce is survived by her immediate family and friends, and a diverse and far-reaching community of champions for the arts.

And finally, Hospitality House extends its deepest condolences to Joyce's husband of 28 years, A. Samson Manalo. Our coworker, our confidant, and our comrade in all things. May you take some solace that Joyce's spirit will forever be part of Hospitality House.

**HIGHLIGHTS OF FY 2022-2023**

- Emerging from the COVID crisis, our community needed healing more than ever. More than 22,000 community residents sought resources, support, and connection through our two Self-Help Centers – assistance with housing and income support, access to individual and group therapy, and participation in support groups and engagement activities. Hospitality House also distributed thousands of free Narcan kits, as part of the citywide battle against drug overdoses.
- Our Employment Team placed nearly 300 job seekers in full or part-time employment or training, continuing to set a high standard for serving unhoused job seekers. Additionally, we hosted Citywide Job Fairs and Employer Spotlights featuring dozens of Bay Area employers, and hundreds of San Francisco job seekers!
- THHE Art Auction 2023 was a rousing success, a magical evening of arts celebration, community engagement, and support for community artists. More than 60 individuals and organizations sponsored this year's event, helping to raise more than \$150,000 for Hospitality House programs.
- In partnership with JP Morgan Chase Bank, the Golden State Warriors, and Noodle Girl Restaurant, our Sixth Street Self-Help Center hosted a hugely successful community celebration with delicious meals for more than 300 community residents!
- More than 750 neighborhood residents participated in one or more of our signature events - Hospitality House in the Park, Hospitality House on the Block, Brush n' Brunch, Walk With Windy - combining civic engagement, community building, and neighborhood pride.
- Hospitality House case management team submitted an amazing 250 Season of Sharing and Emergency Rental Assistance applications - with nearly 200 community members receiving much-needed rental assistance and other support. An incredible lifeline for our community!
- Additionally, with generous support from the Geeslin Family Fund and Tipping Point Community, we provided move-in and rental assistance to 40 community residents. We assisted dozens more with furniture and small appliances, as well as laptops, tuition fees, and school supplies for artists, adult students, and working parents. So grateful for this partnership!
- Our Shelter Team continued to support a cohort of 20 community members who secured permanent housing as part of our relationship-driven placement model. With generous support from Tipping Point, we provided move-in assistance as well as special furniture needs. One year later, they are still housed!

### TENDERLOIN SELF-HELP CENTER

For nearly 40 years, The Tenderloin Self-Help Center has offered low-threshold services for those who may not otherwise use traditional services - including peer counseling, case management, individual and group harm reduction therapy, peer-led support groups, referrals to income support, behavioral health services, housing, and socialization and self-care activities.

**More than 12,000 community residents utilized**

**services at the Tenderloin Self-Help Center this past year.** We've deepened our presence as one of the Tenderloin's most highly utilized wellness hubs. As we emerge from the COVID crisis, we've reactivated our community engagement activities, among them, "Hospitality House On The Block" - activating the street with food, music, wellness activities (COVID testing and vaccinations, screenings, etc.), and resource connections for hundreds of community members.

### SIXTH STREET SELF-HELP CENTER



The Sixth Street Self-Help Center offers a range of emergency, behavioral health, and support services, including but not limited to peer counseling, case management, housing referrals, income support, mental health and substance use resources, individual and group therapy, social engagement, and access to basic amenities. **Nearly 10,000 community residents obtained support from these crucial services this past fiscal year.**

The 6th Street Self-Help Center helped revitalize the Sixth Street Corridor with a range of exciting and creative sidewalk activities - a bi-monthly Brush N' Brunch activity featuring food with arts and crafts in partnership with our Community Arts Program; Picnic in the Park, a unique Hospitality House arts, socialization, and wellness event; and Game Day on the Sidewalk! Together, these creative community events attracted several hundred community residents throughout the year - lifting community spirits and deepening connections as we emerge from the COVID crisis.



### COMMUNITY BUILDING PROGRAM

Our Community Building Program (CBP) is a hub for civic engagement, leadership development, and community building; offering housing support, civic engagement, and healing through our unique trauma-informed project - Healing, Organizing & Leadership Development (HOLD) to help residents manage and heal from the trauma of poverty. Ten new graduates completed the 18-week trauma training series.

Hundreds of community residents participated in a range of voter engagement and civic activities, including "Walk With Windy" - that attracted 125 residents to vote at City Hall. Our popular Committed to Change support, resource and networking group drew more than 75 formerly incarcerated

community members. **Our innovative Flex Fund enabled more than 80 community residents to secure new housing or maintain housing with much needed move-in and rental assistance.** Case managers helped dozens of residents secure permanent housing by negotiating directly with landlords.

Our exciting joint voter engagement project with the Chinese Progressive Association **registered more than 500 community members and contacted another 2000 residents** with nonpartisan voter education materials. In November, CBP was a Department Of Elections polling place with nearly 80 community residents casting their ballots.

### EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM



The Employment Program at Hospitality House offers options for gainful employment and increased stability by helping community residents remove barriers to employment, secure living wage jobs, and pursue career options. We connect homeless and low-income job seekers to employers through hiring and job fairs, as well as expanded support services, job seeker support groups, and partnerships with employers, workforce and employment agencies.

**Our Neighborhood Job Center for the Tenderloin and Sixth Street Corridor placed nearly 300 low-income and homeless job-seekers in full and part-time employment this past year.** We have relationships with dozens of Bay Area employers to connect hundreds of job seekers to good paying jobs. We convene a citywide coalition of community-based workforce providers to advocate for low-income job seekers, and increase workforce investments throughout the City.

# STORIES FROM THE FIELD

The lifeblood of Hospitality House is our community, and the shared struggles and shared triumphs of the lives we connect with every day.

We owe a tremendous debt of gratitude to the dozens of dedicated staff who've dedicated themselves to lifting up the best of our community - day in, day out. The work is challenging. It is meaningful. It is transformative.

Our journeys may have had different beginnings, and the roads had various twists and turns. Many of us were searching for something: renewal and reaffirmation, perhaps. Even redemption. Ultimately, that search - those roads - led us here! To Hospitality House

## COMMUNITY ARTS PROGRAM

The Community Arts Program offers the City's only free studio and gallery space dedicated to uplifting hundreds of talented low-income artists as they create, house and sell artwork. Since 1969, CAP has been the sole fine arts studio and gallery space that is free of charge for artists and residents in our neighborhood. We provide open studio hours, free supplies, and skill-building workshops.

In 2023 THHE AUCTION, our 38th annual art auction, raised more than \$150,000 to support our Community Arts Program and the other Hospitality House programs. Additionally, we host monthly exhibitions and themed shows where participating artists keep 100% of the proceeds from their art sales - making our program a unique social enterprise.

## SHELTER PROGRAM

Although the City closed most of the Shelter-In-Place hotels, including ours, Hospitality House was able to move a cohort of 21 residents into the same permanent supportive housing community in July 2022. As of this writing, 20 of the 21 residents are still housed, with wellness checks, engagement opportunities and other support.

Hospitality House reopened its emergency shelter for 22 men in November 2022, after temporarily closing for more than two years during the height of the COVID crisis. **Eight residents have moved into permanent housing, and 40 residents have obtained income**

**support through public assistance or gainful full/part time employment.** Shelter residents have completed more than 100 housing applications, with assistance from our shelter case manager.

Joyce wanted to make polvoron. She had never made the Filipino treat before but she had this little burst of energy the day after receiving her third chemotherapy treatment and wanted to do something creative. She was always doing something creative.

"I need a polvoron molder," she told her husband Allan (aka Samson), "They should have one at Seafood City." He hopped in his car and zoomed through the fog of Daly City. When Allan got home, he placed the tin molder next to a bag of flour, powdered milk, and pinipig (toasted rice), ingredients Joyce had ordered a week before. By the next day, her energy dissipated and she just wanted to lay down. Weeks later, Allan shelved the polvoron ingredients along with the tin molder. She never got to make her polvoron.

Joyce passed away peacefully on Monday, July 17, 2023 at the home she nurtured and under the care of Allan and her favorite brother Boni, four months after experiencing a stroke, seven months after being diagnosed with Stage 4 ovarian cancer, and almost 22 weeks since she attempted to make her polvaron. She was a fighter until the very end.



For decades, Joyce worked in the Filipin@ community, especially in the SOMA Pilipinas Cultural Heritage District of San Francisco. From leading the theater group Teatro ng Tanan and the Asian American arts organization Kearny Street Workshop to helping Bindlestiff Studio with Allan, supporting countless shows and artists, from co-creating KSW's Celebrate Your Body fashion show to her favorite project of all, producing the Tagalog festival of plays from 2019-2022. She also volunteered each year at Hospitality House' annual art auction.

Joyce will be forever remembered and celebrated for her integral role in shaping and strengthening Filipin@ arts and culture in San Francisco and beyond. Her warm embrace, her cool, no bull-shit humor, and her ability to make others around her shine will be deeply missed at Bindlestiff, SOMA Pilipinas, Hospitality House, and at the home she nurtured with Allan.
